GENERAL INFORMATION GÖTEBORG UNIVERSITY

The latest reform of higher education in Sweden took effect on July 1, 1993.

The reform concerns undergraduate as well as postgraduate education.

UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION

The academic year of Göteborg University is 40 weeks, divided into two terms of 20 weeks each.

Studies are based on a system of "points" with one point approximately corresponding to one week's full time study, class attendance, independent study and contact hours included. The courses are at different levels: introductory level is the first term of study, intermediate level is the second and advanced level is the third and fourth level (advanced 1 and 2). Most courses last for one term (= five months) and yield 20 points. Some courses can be shorter and yield for instance 5 or 10 points. In some subjects introductory and intermediate courses are combined into a course of 40 points, lasting for two terms. Students sit for several intermediate examinations each term. Normally, only one complete 20 point course is taken during one semester.

Tests and grades

Examination procedures vary among departments and from course to course. Most courses, however, contain several intermediate tests. Successful grades are usually given as Pass and High Pass.

Information about the scale is given on the document.

Degrees

A student who has successfully passed all courses required for a certain degree can apply for a degree certificate.

The English names appear on the original Swedish document "Examensbevis".

The "**Diploma in ...**" (*Sw. Högskoleexamen*) is obtained after the fulfilment of course require-

ments adding up to a minimum of 80 points, of which 40 points are required in a major subject. Remaining courses may be chosen freely.

"Degree of Bachelor" (Sw. Kandidatexamen)

is obtained after the fulfilment of course requirements adding up to a minimum of 120 points in all, of which 60 points must be in a major subject. The major subject must include a degree project of at least 10 points. Remaining courses may be chosen freely.

"Degree of Master" (Sw. Magisterexamen)

is obtained after the fulfilment of course requirements adding up to a minimum of 160 points in all, of which 80 points must be in a major subject. The major subject must include a degree project of at least 20 points (or two projects of at least 10 points each). Remaining courses may be chosen freely.

POSTGRADUATE EDUCATION

Anyone who has a degree of at least 120 points meets the general requirements for admission to postgraduate studies.

In addition, the student must meet special requirements pertaining to his/her major subject. In most cases, he/she must have completed courses of at least 60 points in that subject.

The **Licentiate Degree** (*Sw. Licentiatexamen*) comprises 80 points and includes a thesis of at least 40 points.

The **Doctor's Degree** (*Sw. Doktorsexamen*) comprises 160 points. Ideally, these postgraduate studies require four years. In practice, however, they often take more time. For the Doctor's Degree the student must complete postgraduate courses – usually 80 points – and write a dissertation, which has to be publicly defended.
